Wednesday 18. AM. Employed about my house and garden ground.

Wednesday 19. AM. the day very hot, at 12 the thermometer was 91. at 2 P.M. the Governor and self walked to the farm where we dined and in the eve returned home. 8 Thunder and lightning with Rain. The Governor gave the same the same at the same time.

Thursday 20. AM. the day very windy with rain at intervals. the evening cold.

Friday 21. AM. the day very hot with a S.W. wind. at 2 P.M. Mr Grove and self went to Bidson in my boat and on return we landed on the farm here and went home to dinner as usual. Mr Mack gave me 2 loaves of bread which we had for dinner at Mr Grove's.

Saturday 22. AM. the day very hot. 3 P.M. Mr Ambler dined with me. at 5. Mr Harris informed me of some letters that had passed between me and the Governor.

Sunday 23. AM. at 10 the Reverend Divine sermons and preach the sermon on Discontented consciences, after which the Governor returned me thanks before the whole congregation for the excellent sermon. at 5 P.M. I dined with Mr Janson.

Murphy, Mr. Janson and self went in my boat across the river where we felt her lay at anchor below Ralph's Bay on the East side of the river. 1 P.M. the Captain came on shore and waited on the Governor. 3. the Gov sent for me and invited me to dinner to meet the Captain. whose name is Barber. the ship is named Myrtle. an Extra East India ship from Bengal. laden with Spices, Rice and Sugar. this day we have been two years on the Establishment.

Tuesday 15. AM. at 11. Mr Grove and self went in my boat across the river to see for some that had for my house at 2 P.M. we returned and the Gov was sitting to Mr Mack (Capt Barber) but I was engaged by Janson and Mr J. George did not attend.

Wednesday 16. AM. at 1/2 past 9. the Myrtle Capt Barber and Extra Company ship arrived in the Cove and called the Gov. with Mr. Cunn. engaged all the Morn upon business as a Magistrate at 1 P.M. Capt Barber called upon me, but I was upon business with the Governor at 4 rain with Thunder and very hot.

Thursday 17. AM. continual rain all night and in the Morn exceedingly warm. at 10. P.M. Mr Harris dined with me, and in the eve I drank tea with the Governor. Capt Barber there.

Friday 18. AM. the day very hot. at 12 Capt Barber called upon me. P.M. Employed very busy about my new house.

Wednesday 23 am. This morn I breakfasted with Heyer and Capt Barber. at 4 P.M. Mr Harris and George Collins the 400 son dined with me. at 1/2 past 11 P.M. the Gov sent for me when I was in bed and we sat till 2 am upon business. continual rain all the eve and night.

Thursday Jan. 19th AM at noon showers at 3 P.M. the Governor and self went in his boat on board the Myrtle Capt Barber. and he related the Gov with 11 Guns he dined on board and Mr Harris and self at 8 we came away and the hands were all upon deck and gave His Honor the Governor three Cheers when we came away in the boat.

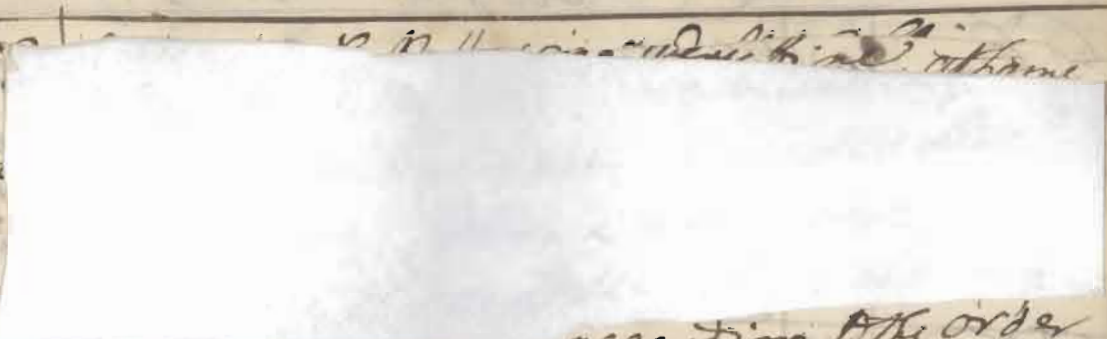

We all fasted there and at 12 Proceed up the river to the first Hall got there about 4 took refreshment and came down to Dennis McCarty's where we find yards the men to fish for seals they caught some and had dinner for supper slept there and had a very wet night the house was not covered in

Wednesday 4 At 11 we made sail and came down the river the wind fair till we came to long reach when it blew a Gale of wind against us it was with great difficulty that we could keep the boat off shore the sea ran very high at 4 o'clock we all came by Hunter's Head we heard a gun fired from a ship in the river and the school went a boat down the river when we got home Mr Little told me what my house

Thursday 5 after breakfast waited upon Mr Harriah who informed me that the Captains name was Chase and the ship's name was from Timor she has 300 Ton of the one year from England at 1 P.M. Mr Humphrey and Mr Bowden called upon me and took refreshment
