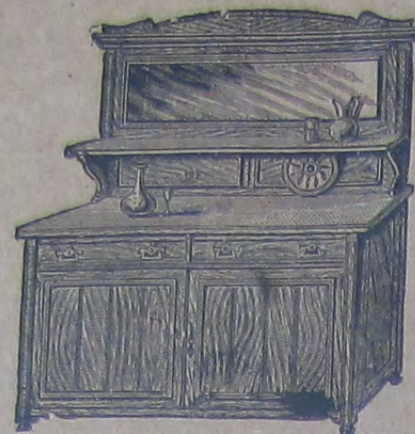



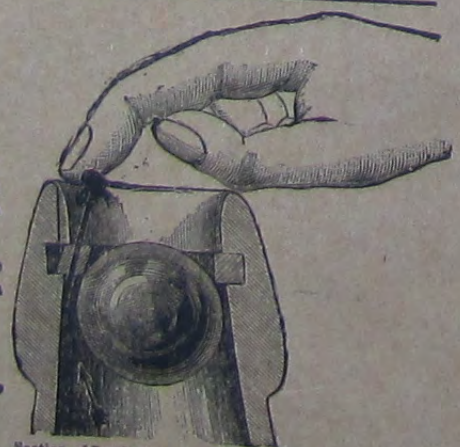

Miss Barlow died & had to lie down morn. Annie n her four children well. Thank God. I send for groceries that Mother & I may need for the house.

1 TUESDAY [1-364]

Circumcision. Bank Holiday, Scotland. 9<sup>h</sup> 8<sup>m</sup> P.M. Total Eclipse of Sun invisible at Greenwich

Been fine, but cool breeze. Mother in garden a little. Mark came to dinner & stays the night. Mabel & Miss Hannaford left Betty & Paul at Mayfield while they drove here. Mark prefers doing up a cottage about here to live instead of Tirryah to rent. I took Grey to Elin picking black & red currants & few raspberries - on to Mayfield for beans, & some gooseberries - Bertie Solly came down to scrub for carrots - arrived home by 6 oc. P.M.

2 WEDNESDAY [2-363]

Been unusually warm - clouded afternoon a little & few drops of rain last night. Mother & I drove up to see Mr Plunkett this afternoon, we walked to look at stone cottage by bridge. Henry Greenhouse & I helped Mother water then picked over currants morn, & I bottled four pints. Mark took bread afternoon to Tirryah. Bertie Solly called & waited 4 oc. tea. Marianne offers to try her new work for a month. Miss Barlow goes on I pay both.

Been fine afternoon, rain at night & this morning measured 95 points - Mark down from Tirryah morn & stays night. I boiled red currant jelly (4 pints?) mixed sugar for 3 pints raspberry acid, & boiled leavings for plain jam. Mother looking out Marks blankets & linen morn. I made some kitchen towels, read Genl. Gordon, &c. Billinger went to meet boy Tom Savage from Formby by coach. I hope he will suit me, & work for schabbling, food & clothes. I put young chicken into swans house. Marianne home.

4 FRIDAY [4-361]

Been cool air, thunder shower at 12 oc noon. Mother had Grey a little, & with Tom Savage, Miss Barlow Marianne, & I, took up dining room carpet & down in sitting room, sitting room carpet for drawing room, & that one of Marks folded up for them, old, old, Brussels upside down for dining room. Oil cloth rolled up for Mark. Tom hoeing garden paths. Mark left for Tirryah after 5 oc. P.M. I got few gooseberries for tea from garden here.

5 SATURDAY [5-360]

Points rain for yesterday, few drops cold & breeze. Mother sewing a shirt for Savage &c. Mark down to breakfast & back to Tirryah at dusk. Mabel & Miss Hannaford down morn to see cottage & call here. Boy & I were picking 7 lbs raspberries & some cherries at Eln garden - Monday

6 SUNDAY Epiphany [6-359] Twelfth Day. Old Christmas Day

Been in breeze rough sea - Mark came afternoon. Mother about Bertie Solly rode to Tirryah, twice I drove Tom Savage to Prehawk, & Dick Dalton on to Tirryah. I was with them most of the time. Mr. Prohibition paid & had cherries. Mr. G. & D. Salter called then. Mr. Murrells, De Gaulle & Mr. Kuttaworth called on Mabel. Ed. passed after being in truck with Mr. Murrells.

Had plenty in the morn. I got the boy & I were picking 7 lbs raspberries & some cherries at Eln garden - Monday

St. Dista's Day

Been fine cold freeze. Mother very well. Mark & Mabel brought Miss Hannaford to Church & tea. Ed, Annie & their children called. brought Mr Parramour from near Campbell Town who came over the tiers from Soull's lake looking for cattle. Miss Barlow & I taught Sunday school & called to see Aida Plunkett.

8 TUESDAY [8-357]

St. Lucian, P. & M. Cambridge Lent Term

Been fine breeze N.E. afternoon. Mother busy in garden a little. I put away jams &c. & took out old crockery with Mother for use. Made up some of my accounts. Hope to be able to keep house for Mother - D.V. within income. Groceries landed by steamer on beach evening late. Mark waited for post & went off 7-400. P.M. for Sirrah. Miss Barlow & Marianne, went to beach & brought parcels up. Boy Tom hoeing paths. Bertie Solly down morning said Edwin was ill & I sent for, but he came

9 WEDNESDAY [9-356]

Fire Insurance Days of Grace expire 10 43 A.M.

Been fine & quite warm breeze. Mother & I drove to Mayfield to ask for Edwin, who is in bed but better, thank God. I called to ask for Mrs Jenkins's baby, she is better too. We took boy Tom with us to open gates. I called to see Mrs Aida Plunkett. Miss Barlow & Marianne busy unpacking my groceries & putting out Marks. Paid small bill to cart them up early. Watered flowers eve & did up a broken window-pane with ceiling wase. Mark here late.

Been warm, morn, clouded & N.E. breeze. Took Mother's buggy & our horses to Crk. Garden for cherries. Miss Barlow, Marianne, & boy Tom. Hurried home about 12 oc. & got dinner. Bertie Solly came for cherries & we left him picking. Tried to kill a big snake. Mark left to take Edwin's 70c. service at Cottages. Mabel, Miss Hannaford, Paul, & Bertie came to dinner & left at 5 oc. Mr & Mrs Fred Shaw & Mrs Bernard Shaw came to dinner & off about 5 oc. It was a hurry for us. I got Marianne to get flour of mine for bread for first time.

11 FRIDAY [11-354]

Hilary Law Sittings commence

Been fine warm morn; clouded & cool breeze N.E. Mother gardening, sewed pieces on carpets, busy. Mark down to tea with pagnel & back eve. I put cherries in 10 bottles to preserve, & boiled more for jam. Miss Barlow, boy Tom & I drove in hooded buggy to Crk. Garden for raspberries afternoon got about 12 lbs. Marianne helped me turn out sheep from front field at dusk. I called to ask for Henry Gray & saw small at doing the cottage for Mark & Mabel.

12 SATURDAY [12-353]

Been fine. clouds about. Mother saw Stedwick tidy Mark's store & put groceries away of Marks. I helped boy tidy up 3 flower beds by side gate. He hoed round beds & half front border, scalded & swept of ants, watered some flowers & got some cherries from orchard. I gave out rations; up at 1/4 to 5 oc. P.M. & did up

13 SUNDAY - 1 aft Epiph [13-352]

St. Hilary, B. & C.

Been dull, drizzled eve. Mother got some flowers for Nellie & Lois, Edwin Annie Miss Solly & Bertie called before Church with the children. Mark, Miss Hannaford, & Bertie the maid came & left after tea. They all went to Swanee yesterday & Mabel was there & stayed with her at Sirrah. Miss Barlow & I taught Sunday school. Miss Plunkett to tea & her niece May Plunkett

Oxford Hilary Term begins. Plough Monday

2 1/2 in rain by gauge. Heavy rain Thunder & lightning from 7 oc. to 10 oc. A.M. clearing since, slight rain last night - high flood 26 sheep washed down creek. Mark tried to save them - Shadwick got 40 out from Elm, 3 almost drowned. Tom Savage took post & got wet, he is to milk now for me & go to school. Begun to read 2nd vol. of Illustrated Australasia - begun mantledrape of pieces of black cloth & peacocks feathers. Mark rode to breakfast from Siryah.

15 TUESDAY [15-350]

Been fine. Mother about disapointed Mr Champ did not come tonight. I made pastry, wrote two letters - read aloud, drove for fruit & vegetables with Miss Barlow & Tom Savage; Mark came up for us & then drove up again to mail. He has been about. Shadwick killed a four feet long black snake up near the sheds. Mark's dog killed a musk rat by front field evening. Mrs Bellenger in washing, sprained her hand a little.

16 WEDNESDAY [16-349]

Been fine. Mother planted out stocks, morn. Mark took dinner & burning at Dyer's run at Boomer Ck. Tea tree - Mr J. Gill came to dinner, he is looking for Codlin moths in the orchards & we have all to pay 4/ per acre or part of orchard. Mr W. Kust came tea time. I drove Miss Barlow to Siryah, calling at Trehawe, Mayfield, returning. Mabel & Miss Hannaford came back & gave us tea & then returned to sketch along the road. I skinned a musk rat & a rabbit, trying to tan skins with alum another way.

St. Anthony. O 5 37<sup>m</sup> A.M. Partial Eclipse of Moon partly visible at Greenwich

Been cool breeze N. Mother has bronchitis slightly & came down late & did not have meals in sitting room. Mr Kust left after breakfast. Mark about & to Saltworks - seeing cottage "The Wattle's" done up at Creek. I drove Miss Barlow, Miss Plunkett & Tom (to take Vanity to the stable) to Hop Cottages to Edwin & Annie's meeting (about 40 persons). Miss Barlow, Mariann, & I picked some cherries in orchard & see few mulberries ripe. Mariann out walking - Miss Barlow also. Little Lucy is ill today.

18 FRIDAY [18-347]

St. Prisca, V. & M.

Been fine. Mother could not sleep well, but came down & seems better tonight, thank God. Mark has been about, drove Mabel, Paul, Miss Hannaford & girl Betty back to Siryah - they came when we were at dinner. I counted fowls 47 including 15 chicks, that is 16 killed & 10 missing from July's count of 58. Bertie Solly rode down & stayed to dinner. I read aloud Illustrated Australasia. Helped boy Tom to churn butter after tea.

19 SATURDAY [19-346]

Been fine & warm, cloudy at first. Mother better, I am thankful to say, & about. Mark down to breakfast & away about 8 oc. P.M. for Siryah. Miss Barlow picked up Mrs Bellenger, went up so far with me. I took Ada & Miss Plunkett to Siryah, picniced & near creek with Paul.

20 SUNDAY - 2 aft Epiph [20-345]

St. Fabian, B. & M.

Been fine. Mother about the house, but not outside. Mark did not come to Church. Edwin drove maid & three children & on here to call & see Mother. Bertie Solly also. Miss Barlow, & I, taught Sunday school. Miss Plunkett to tea.

St. Agnes, V. & M.

Been warm, clouded evening. Mother & I, did a little gardening after 3 o'clock. Small & Tom Savage swept chimneys in the evening. Mark down from Siryah to breakfast, was reaping wheat in Saddy's field near school. Wilfrid Giblin came before tea from Siryah - he has been out swarming & up at Modelling Sagorn. Musk-rat skin, tanned very well with alum & saltpetre. Mended dresses &c.

22 TUESDAY [22-343]

St. Vincent, D. & M.

Been fine, cool breeze N. ... Mother out in garden an hour; drove to call on Mr. Plunkett, the Miss Harlow & Mother went over to see Mark's cottage. I left those two at Mayfield & took Nellie, Lois, & Rupert with Miss Harlow to scrub for box of carrots. Kerty, Solly riding about helped put them in buggy. Children helped us pick some black currants. Miss B. & I got some flour, I sat on the carrots to make room home. Mark reaping wheat in Stagg's field. Wilfrid Giblin left for Siryah with

23 WEDNESDAY [23-342]
