

161 CODEX IUSTINIANUS (fragment) – Franciscus Accursius
GLOSSA ORDINARIA (fragment) – in Latin – 14c.

Vellum, 335 × 235mm., two folios, no pagination or foliation.

Brown ink fading, ruling brown ink, two cols, the number of lines of text per col. ranging from 17 to 45, and for the Glossa surrounding it there are as many as 89 lines. The script is second half 14c. Italian *littera gothica textualis (bononiensis)*.

Decoration: red rubrics; caps alternately red, with blue penwork and blue, with red penwork.

The sheets were pasted inside the covers of C. Plinius Secundus, *Diuinum opus cui titulus historia mundi*, J. Frobenius, Basle 1525. The book was formerly owned by Dr F. R. Nixon¹ who deposited it in the Diocesan Library in Hobart, whence it passed at an unknown date to the Library of Christ College.

1r.^a (The fragment opens abruptly in Liber VI, viiii, 6 with:) *Iuris ignorantiam nec mulieribus prodesse in edicti perpetui cursum . . .* (it continues without interruption on col.b, and on verso a and b where it breaks off, in Lib. VI, xvi, 2) . . . *functus est ac tu licet quinto gradu constitutus ex suc-*

2r.^a (Opens abruptly in Lib. VI, xx, 21) *-denda hereditate ex prisci iuris auctoritate minime cogebantur . . .* (it continues, much rubbed, without interruption to 2v.^b where it breaks off in Lib. VI, xxi, 6) . . . *institutus eius substitutione facta inuicem.*

The Glossa is much rubbed and effaced in places. A legible section is that concerning Lib. VI, xxi, 2 which is found on 2r.^a-2r.^b:

Si miles. commilitonem. uel alium quemlibet. bona. paganica possedit (sic)

etiam si nichil probet secundum Jo. Set contra supra lege proxima probatur in fine ubi uidetur quod iure (sic) probet. Solutio aliud cum quis instituitur in paganis quia tunc trahuntur castrensia quasi accessoria ut ibi aut e contra tunc non trahuntur ut (2r.^b) hic at Jo. contrarium. extraneum. in paganis et alium in castrensibus ut supra dixi secus si tantum in castrensibus extraneum. alii contra distingunt (sic) enim utrum commilitonem.
